This paper deals with Stephen Sommers's movie "The Mummy," released in 1999 (c.f. International Movie Database, IMDb). It might be considered a Blockbuster, as it was able to not only regain but more than double its budget within the opening weekend alone (c.f. *ibid.*). What are the reasons for such a success?
